
# **ERICA TAZEL**



Hailing from Dallas, Texas, **Erica Tazel** has made an impression on her Hollywood peers establishing herself as a notable and versatile actress. In 2015, Tazel wrapped six years on the critically acclaimed series "Justified" on FX. She currently stars on the event series "Roots" for the History channel.

She has an engaging list of television credits with guest-starring roles on Emmy® and Golden Globe® Award-winning shows such as *The Office, ER, Law & Order, Law & Order: SVU, Sex and The City, Life, Heartland, Bones* and *Firefly*; recurring roles on *Jericho* and *Third Watch*, and she took a guest leading position on *Without A Trace*.

Erica has made quite a few appearances Off-Broadway in Playwrights Horizons' *Juvenilia*, Royal Shakespeare Company's *Cymbeline*, and New York Shakespeare Festival's *A Winter's Tale* where she made her professional debut.

Her extensive list of regional theatre projects in which she has performed took her to Laguna Playhouse, The Colony Theatre, Hartford Theater Works, The Old Globe, Dallas Theatre Center, Arizona Theater Company and Williamstown Theatre Festival.

In 2007, she earned the prestigious NAACP Theatre Award for Best Lead Female and a Los Angeles Drama Critics Circle Nomination for Lead Performance for her portrayal of "Juliette" in I Have Before Me a Remarkable Document Given To Me by a Young Lady from Rwanda.

Most recently, Erica was bus coordinator for *Get on the Bus*, an organization that reunites children with their incarcerated parent for Mother's and Father's Day, a construction laborer in a rebuilding project in Haiti, and a recreational entertainer at Sparrow Rainbow Village, an AIDS hospice and orphanage in Johannesburg, South Africa, all – considered her most important and transformational roles yet.

Erica received her B.A in Theater from Spelman College and M.F.A. from NYU's Graduate Acting Program.




### TV Review: 'Roots'



"The various reunions, homecomings, and tragedies are given shading and vitality by Emayatzy Corinealdi (Belle), Forest Whitaker (Fiddler), Erica Tazel (Matilda), and Noni Rose, who should be remembered during awards season for their terrific performances. Regé-Jean Page, who may have the biggest shoes to fill as Chicken George, a character Ben Vereen unforgettably portrayed in the original, delivers a quite creditable performance."

Kunta, Kizzy, George, and their descendants were slaves, but in "Roots," they are never victims. Rather, they are folk heroes — and American originals."



"It really wasn't until I sat my 16-year-old boy down and forced him to



#### On source material.

"Anika [Noni Rose] and I went to the Whitney Plantation, which is the only museum in the country that is from the perspective of the enslaved person.... I picked up a book of slave narratives of women from the part of the country we were in. I started every day with one of these tales, just to get me into the time and the mentality and the extraordinary circumstances that these women were able to live under."

#### On the importance of women in 'Roots.'

"We are literally the physical carriers of this lineage that begins with Kunta Kinte and Alex Haley—from giving birth to these incredible people to also passing down what I've called the ancestral torch, which can be anything from familial traditions, cultural customs, religious faith, whatever we got from our mothers and our dads."

#### On audience takeaways.

"The one thing is reminding [audiences] that as African-American people in this country, our history does not begin with slavery. That we were people that predated [slavery]. Our time in Africa, whichever part of the coast, we came from a wonderfully deep civilization. If we have done our job well, there is potentially a child unborn who will see this and be excited about who he or she is and where they come from, and will be inspired to connect to his or her own roots, despite race, gender, and socioeconomic background."

There are undoubtedly many Erica Tazel fans in the business. I am so grateful to them, because I know when the opportunities come, they will call me. 2015 allowed me the chance to portray a female Deputy U.S. Marshal. From there, I played a First Lady of a church who suffers the devastating loss of her baby, which results in a crisis of faith. I played a Ugandan shopkeeper who is "correctively raped" because the men of her village assume she is a lesbian, because she is not married. I had to learn to speak Luganda for that. Very cool. I played a resident of the Ninth Ward who goes undercover as a Haitian Voodoo Priestess to exact revenge for the death of family member. Then, I ended the year with Roots, where I play a woman from the age of 17 to 57. The combination of these roles is what I pray will change the conversation about my range and abilities as an actor. I also hope it changes the quality of opportunities presented to me.

The film, Roots, was a classic film portraying blacks in the days of slavery. You're now starring in the mini series for the History Channel. How were you first introduced to the project and besides the history behind it, what made you want to take this on?

I had huge reservations going into it. How could you not, when the original included the great talents of Cicely Tyson, Madge Sinclair, Olivia Cole, Maya Angelou, Lestie Uggams, Louis Gossett, Jr. Ben Vereen and so many others? Talk about big shoes. However, Charles Murray wrote a stunning script that made me reconsider this as a possibility for me, along with an encounter with a group of teenagers who stunningly, had very little knowledge of many parts of our collective history as African Americans in this country. After that, I felt a responsibility to put my reservations aside.

#### What can viewers expect to see from your character, Matilda?

Matilda is the daughter of Rev. Benjamin Lyons who goes on to marry Chicken George and gives birth to Kunta Kinte's 8 great grandchildren. She will be introduced in Night 3. We see her from age 17 to 57. Without giving away plot points, Matilda is one of the three extraordinary matriarchs of the family we will follow over the course of this four night, eight hour event. She is a reflection of the many black women of that era, who exhibited unbelievable faith and strength to keep her sanity and family together under some pretty extraordinary circumstances. The ending of her story, along with her children and husband is something I am very proud of and hope will be moving to the audience. More importantly, I hope it gives our young people an example of the broad shoulders on which they stand and that they can be very proud of that. I also hope it inspires them to seek out more examples of who we are.

It is clearly not being taught in the schools.

We love what you've been showcasing on the red carpet. Who are some of your favorite fashion designers and styles that we would find in your closet?

I had a chance to wear a piece by Sergio Hudson to the Critics Choice Awards tast year that I absolutely loved. He's been on my radar ever since. Atelier Versace, Vivian Westwood, Lavin, Elie Saab, Prada, Ralph Lauren and Zuhair Marad have all had stunning pieces on the carpet that have caught my eye. I'm a fan and look to wearing pieces from those collections. My closet, however, is really simple. I'm a girl who does not like to shop. Spring and Summer, my bohemian comes out. I love a loose flow in a sundress, head wraps and sandals. Fall and Winter, I revert to East Coast chic. I love a rice coat, a sharp boot, scarves and hats. I'm really low maintenance when it comes to clothes.

What other projects do you have coming up in the

I cannot reveal the name of this project, but I will show up in a much anticipated project in the gaming world some time this summer. Gubagude Ko directed by Philiane Phang, where I play the Ugandan shopkeeper, will premiere April 12th as a part of the AFI Directing Workshop for Women.

#### Justified's Erica Tazel on Being a Woman of Color in a Cowboy World



ustified kicks off strong tonight. The modern-day Western, from the twisty mind of novelist Elmore
Leonard and veteran TV showrunner Graham Yost shakes off the cloud of criticism that hung
around it in Season 5 with a vengeance. The show's final season (of which I've seen the first three
episodes) is maybe its strongest yet, with the promised showdown between the lawman Raylan Givens
(Timothy Olyphant) and the outlaw Boyd Crowder (Walton Goggins) finally coming to pass. But as the
clock strikes high noon in Kentucky's Harlan County, it becomes clear that the show is about more than just
pistols at dawn or cops and robbers.

Justified has always been a show about history, roots, and family. The family you grew up with, and the family you make. As we head into the final season Erica Tazel, who has played Deputy U.S. Marshal Rachel Brooks for five seasons, steps into the role of interim chief, a.k.a., Raylan's boss, a.k.a., the materfamilias. We spoke with Tazel about her time on Justified and her theory about who, if anyone, will leave Harlan alive.

VF Hollywood: We spoke with creator Graham Yost last year about the backlash around Season 5. The show was a critical darling for most of its run, what do you think went wrong last season?

Erica Tazel: I think what the writers do is incredibly difficult, you know, spinning so many plates. What's great about Elmore's work, I mean true Elmore, is that you get to spond so much time with the bad guys. The writers on the show love that. I think that we all agree that we spun too many plates last year, but the beautiful thing about this season is that it gets reined in and we get back to what we're good at. Five seasons in, I don't think that's such a bad thing. You try some things, maybe they don't work, and that's why it's called a creative process. I think what they are doing this season is more in line with what we started in Season 2.

#### Robert Piper: What inspires you?

Erica Turel: I am inspired by great food, theater, books, the beach, black-and-white photography, and great vocalists, like Dianne Reeves, Alice Smith, and Shirley Horn. I am inspired by my mentor Diana Castle, who is guiding me towards a truth and honesty in my life and work that I have always longed for. #### RP: What is the hardest obstacle you've had to overcome in your life?


ET: There was a period of time between 2005 and 2008 that was pretty challenging. I had taken a leap of faith and moved to Los Angeles from New York, which had been incredible to me peofessionally. I couldn't get arrested in this town. There was a lot of doubt and fear that crept in, and boy, did insecurity stick her foot up in it. There were many obstacles that were overcome during that very dark period-creative, financial, emotional, and spiritual-and I'm here, standing, stronger than ever.

#### RP: How do you stay healths?

ET: For mental and emotional health, quiet time is very important to me. I need a point in every day that I disconnect from all electronics and reconnect to my center. I pray and meditate. I drink a ton of water and believe in a good night's sleep. Because of old sports injuries, yoga has become a physical lifesaver. I also have an honest, loving, and caring circle of friends. A little bit of laughter and an occasional adult beverage never hort nobody.

#### RP: How do you deal with overcoming failure?

ET: In recent years, I have begun to regard everything as more of a process so that the sense of right and wrong diminishes in my psyche. That's been healthy for me and makes everything so much more fun. If something does not quite work out as expected or planned, I simply look for what did work, what I learned from the situation, and really try to keep it moving forward.



#### RP. What projects are you working on?

ET: I am finishing up the final two episodes of Juntial on FX. I have: movie hopefully coming out this year called Me Right [in which I have a role] opposite Columbus Short. I also have been reading scripts and taking meetings around town. So we will see.

rica Tazel promises fans that the final season of Justified will be full of twists and turns. Tazel, who plays Marshal Rachel Brooks on the critically acclaimed series, couldn't reveal too much (for obvious reasons) but did spill that in the final season viewers will get to witness a lot of action amongst the triangle of Raylan (Timothy Olyphant), Ava (Joelle Carter) and Boyd (Walton Goggins). Tazel promises action and drama in the inevitable showdown that will happen bet-

ween the main cast. "We're going to see lines drawn, alliances betrayed, and alliances formed." Lucky for her, she gets to know what happens on the show before any of us do. She almost can't contain her excitement over how intense the show is getting in its final season. Speaking to Next Big Thing just after reading the script for the sixth episode she says, "I almost peed my pants, like Oh my god where is the next episode — what's going to happen!" However, much like us, the viewer, she is still in the dark in regards to how the final season is going to end. You'd think working on scripts would require a down-time to recuperate, but Erica says it's just the opposite. She attributes the surprisingly laid back feeling on set to her co-stars, Timothy Olyphant, Nick Searcy and Jacob Pitts, who she says are pros at keeping it fum on set working on dramatic scenes. "There's always an air of lightness on the set," she says. "Even if we are shooting something that's pretty intense so at the end of the day, for me, it's not hard to shake it off."

In fact, she says it is the night before that brings any stress. "I think my point of tension is usually the night before," she says. "It sort of precedes the work instead of proceeds." Playing Rachel has been a crucial part of Erica's attempt at diversifying the repertoire of mediums she's comfortable with. Hailing originally from the theatres of New York, she left for California in order to gain experience in You ching. Fans need not be afraid, Erica insists she is still very much in love with the theatre and even tries to fit in plays during her hiatuses from Justified. Breaking into TV was just the next logical step as these days actors are expected to be triple threats: TV, theatre, and movie experts. "It's my feeling that with the way the business is constructed now, as many of those mediums that you can be proficient in, the better."

Gone are the days of working just in TV, film, or theatre. Taxel says she really had to push herself out of her comfort zone for her role on Justified. Not only was it a huge foray into TV acting, there was also a lot to learn for her character. Having never held a real gua before, she wanted to get some handson experience at the Glynco training centre for US marshals. Unfortunately, due to post 9/11 measures, she was unable to, instead she worked closely with the advisors on set. It wasn't just weapon training she needed, she also needed to fully understand the mentality within a group of marshals — especially what it takes to be a female in a predominantly male precinct, "You can only prepare so much for a TV role initially", she notes while working on a play you know the full story of your character but when it comes to TV, there is always a lot that's unknown; it is generally an open book.

With her many talents, it's surprising to hear that Erica didn't always realize she wanted to be an actor. Although she went to a High School of performing arts, it wasn't until her sophomore year of college that she realized she needed to act after going to see a production put on at her school. "I ended up going to a show and I realized immediately upon walking into the theatre that this was where I was supposed to be and it was at that point that I changed my life." She changed her major from "Bio and Premedical Studies" t "Theatre" and later went to grad school for theatre at NYU. Originally, her aspirations was to work in the medical field as a physiotherapist. Her interests in helping others never left and thanks to the hiatuses she gets between seasons breaks she often dedicates her time to giving back. She has spent extensive time in places like South Africa helping out at AIDS clinics with 'Habitat for Humanity'. Erica also went to Haiti soon after the earthquake. At home, she is also a supporter of 'Get on the Bus', an organization that helps kids visit their incarcerated parents on Mother's and Father's day. "I'm living the dream and part of that dream is to be able to also serve in some capacity because it's a daily reminder of how fortunate I am and how lucky I am to hav a job that I love and to be able to make a living doing what I want to do. I don't ever want to lose the ground under my feet."





Taking time from her busy life, she opens up to Cliché about her path to becoming an actress, her work on Justified, and her plans for the future. BY BRITTANY N. HUSKEY

Cliché: In life, we face many different crossroads. One crossroad that you faced was whether or not to go into medicine or follow your heart and take up acting. How did you decide which path to take and what would you tell someone facing a similar problem in their life? Erica Tazel: The fork in the road between being a physical therapist vs. an actor was more of a surprise to me than a problem. It really was. Although I had gotten the beginnings of extensive theatre training at Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing and Visual Arts in Dallas, TX, I sincerely was not aware of or present to a desire to tell stories for a living. I initially auditioned for Booker T. as an option to not have to attend the school in whose district I lived in I did not think I would fit in at that school and who wants to spend four years like that? I heard about Booker T. at lunch from a friend in 8th grade and it sounded like t .m l/he movie FAME which was very exciting to me. Would we really have iam sessions in the lunch room and would the dancers really walk around all day in leotards? That sounded like a cool alternative!

So I went for it and it was a glotious time for me creatively. When I entered Spelman College as a Biology Pre-Med major, I honestly had every intention of completing that coursework and going on to medical school with a focus in physical therapy. However, during the first semester of my sophomore year in college, a friend invited me to see a show the Theatre and Dance department was putting on. It may sound crazy, but when I valked into the theater, I unexpectedly began to cry. I felt like I had come home. I knew in that very moment that I had to change courses. If this decision presented a "problem," it was the fact of telling my parents.

I value my life very much and I was sure this decision was not going to go over well. Luckily I was 900 miles away from home! So in many ways, I feel like acting chose me. Although I had no clue how to pursue a career in acting, I had tremendous peace about taking that path. I just "hnew," so I jumped and I have yet to regret that leap. I do not take for granted that for other artists it was not, and in some case, still not that clear. So my advice, if I can call it that, is to sit very quietly with your dreams, with what you really want, and be very honest about that. If at the end of the day, you feel like you MUST do such and such, then go for it. There is no rule book for a career in acting, so it is also a faith is ourney of monumental proportions!

Because you chose to follow your heart, you have been in television shows, movies, and theater productions. Have you found that you enjoy working in one of these areas more than the other?

The mediums give me very different things that I appreciate very much. Theater has offered me the most diverse and challenging opportunities. I enjoy being a part of an ensemble that I get to play with eight shows a week. I love the process of rehearsal and the live audience/in the moment aspect of theater. There is usually at least a four-week rehearsal period before a theater run begins. In TV, there may be four minutes of rehearsal especially if there is a last minute rewrite, so the homework is much more condensed. I love this medium because there is no time for me to get in my head about the work. My imagination is exercised in a very different way in television. Unlike theater, in TV I may only get to have that conversation three times! I am looking forward to my first film opportunities to see what I learn and experience there. I aspire to be comfortable and compelling telling story in all three mediums.

With Justified in its fifth season, what do you think about the evolution of your character from season one until now? Has she surprised you in anyway?

While I have always imagined Rachel to be an ambitious woman who cares deeply about her work, it has been delightful to see her permit herself to have fun at the same time. That's been a nice point in her evolution. She's very serious and by the book, so I love when she allows herself to cut up a bit. To that point, I was surprised and thrilled, on some level, that in episode five, I believe, of this season, Rachel decides to go down to Harlan with Raylan to look for Danny Crowe, not so much to "babysit," but to get a piece of the action.

#### Who do you want to work with more before the show reaches its end in season six?

I am very pleased with the work Jacob Pitts and I did towards the end of this season. We work well together and I would love to do more with him. I had my first conversation with Boyd Crowder which seems to potentially set up more interaction for the final season which would be great! I would love to be on camera with Walton more before this ends. Joelle Carter and I have only passed each other on screen so I would also like to spend some time with her as well. Then that would pretty much cover all of the series regulars, at least.

#### Do you have any ideas on where your character will be at the end of the series?

The great thing about Rachel is there are so many avenues the writers can take her in the final season. So many great opportunities there. My only wish is that the audience has an opportunity to finally see why Art says Rachel is his best Marshal.
